
David Tracy is a University Professor of Theology and the Director of the Center for the Study of Religion and Society at the University of Chicago.

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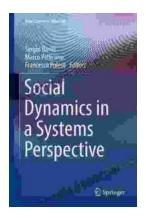
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
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
